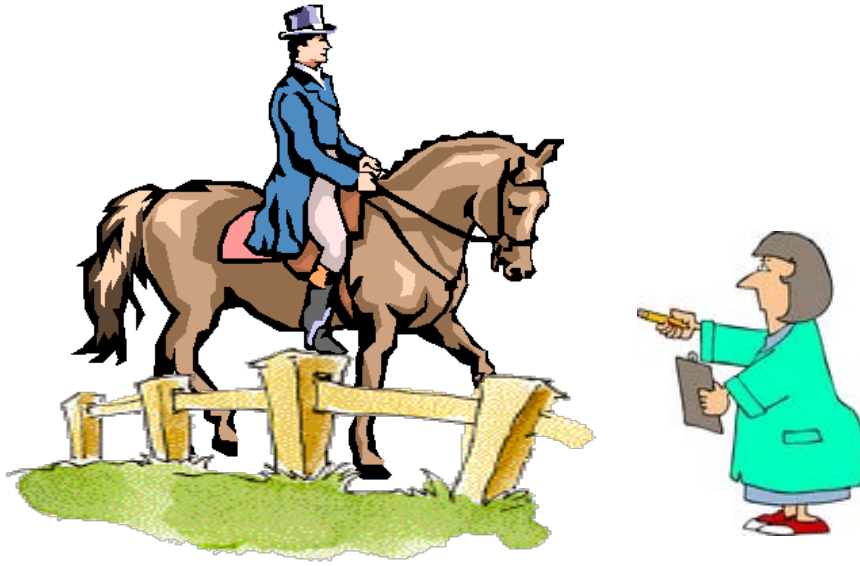




# RING STEWARD



Based on USEF Rules Effective 1 Dec 2009





- ❖ **USEF DR121.9. Ring stewards appointed by competition management must check saddlery and inspect bits and spurs on both sides of the horse for at least one-third of the horses in each class.**
  1. *Inspection of saddlery and bits must be done at the direction of the technical delegate. Inspection of saddlery and bits must be done immediately as the horse leaves the arena. (See DR126.11)*
  2. *The checking of the bridle must be done with the greatest caution, as some horses are very touchy and sensitive about their mouths.*
  3. *Bit inspectors must use a new disposable protective glove for each horse.*
  4. *The responsibility for the correct attire and equipment, however, still rests with the competitor.*
  5. *When communicable disease is a concern, any deviations to established saddlery inspection protocol must be approved by the USEF Dressage Department prior to the competition.*
- ❖ **USEF DR126.1.i. Ring Stewards and supervision of schooling areas. EC 9/21/09 Effective 12/1/09**
  - 1) *Management must appoint ring stewards to check saddlery and inspect bits and spurs, on both sides of the horse, in each class at the direction of the technical delegate and in accordance with DR121.9.*
  - 2) *When a competition operates two or more rings or warmup areas, the competition must have a sufficient number of stewards to adequately monitor all schooling and warmup areas, as well as competition rings.*
  - 3) *Schooling and warmup areas must be monitored by stewards starting at least 30 minutes before the first scheduled ride.*
  - 4) *Bit inspectors must use a new disposable protective glove for each horse. Gloves must be provided by competition management.*
  - 5) *When communicable disease is a concern, any deviations to established saddlery inspection protocol must be approved by the USEF Dressage Department prior to the competition.*
  - 6) *In USEF/USDF Championship classes, a steward must be appointed to check the saddlery and bits of each horse immediately after it has completed its test and has left the arena, and any discrepancy to the saddlery rules will entail immediate elimination. (See DR121.9)*



# RING STEWARD

## *Types, Function and Attributes*



### TYPES

- ❖ Depending upon the size and type of show, there may be two types of ring steward:
  - Warm-up ring steward
  - Competition ring steward
- ❖ Ring stewards should dress for weather conditions and provide their own insect repellent, sunscreen, sunglasses, etc.

### FUNCTIONS AND ATTRIBUTES

- ❖ Ring Stewards are given an updated show schedule (showing all ride times) and receive changes from the Show Office during the show. In order to track rides, the steward records the changes on his/her show schedule.
- ❖ Ring Stewards make NO remarks about any horse or rider in the competition, including but not limited to, any background information about any horse or rider, their trainer, etc.
- ❖ Ring Stewards usually work outside in all types of weather so should dress for weather conditions and provide their own insect repellent, sunscreen, sunglasses, etc.
- ❖ Due to liability exposure do not adjust any rider's tack.
- ❖ Attributes and Skills Needed:
  - Ability to read bridle tags from a distance
  - Tactful speaking skills
  - Supportive and courteous tone



# RING STEWARD

## *Procedures*



### PROCEDURES FOR WARM-UP RING STEWARDS

- ❖ Are positioned near a designated warm-up arena.
- ❖ Log in riders on their show schedule as they arrive at the warm-up arena.
- ❖ As a courtesy, may remind riders that their ride time is approaching.
- ❖ If the competition arena is running early, advise riders they may go early, if desired.
- ❖ Advise riders if the competition arena is running late.
- ❖ Advise the Competition Ring Steward if a rider has not arrived in a timely manner. (NOTE: At shows with more than one warm-up arena, a rider may be at a different warm-up arena.)
- ❖ Ensures there are not more riders than can safely warm-up in the ring.
- ❖ Reports any dangerous or inhumane warm-up practices or other situations to the Technical Delegate.

### PROCEDURES FOR COMPETITION RING STEWARDS

- ❖ Are positioned near a designated competition arena.
- ❖ Ensure the correct rider enters the correct competition arena at the correct time.
- ❖ At any given time, there should only be:
  - One rider in the dressage ring,
  - One rider waiting to go in (“on deck”), and
  - One rider waiting to be “on deck” (“in the hole”)
- ❖ It is NOT your responsibility to search for the next rider.
- ❖ Walkie/Talkies: At some shows you will have a walkie/talkie and will need to tell the Announcer which rider is going into the show ring next. Communication over the walkie/talkie should be kept to a minimum. Usually the Announcer simply wants to know who is entering the competition ring. (Ex. “Ring 2, entry 34 has entered.”)
- ❖ You may politely remind competitors to drop whips before entering USEF Championship classes or point out that they forgot to remove their horse's boots.
- ❖ If the ring is running ahead of schedule, the “on deck” rider may go in early but cannot be required to go in early.
- ❖ Mark your show schedule when a competitor enters the competition arena. If a rider scratches, is eliminated, or withdraws, mark this on the show schedule. This is very important to track “missing” dressage test sheets.
- ❖ After the rider in the show ring has finished his/her final salute, the next rider may warm-up around the perimeter of the ring.
- ❖ If there is a break between rides, do not allow the next rider to warm-up around the perimeter of the ring. To do so would constitute an unfair advantage to that rider. Some shows allow riders in the show rings during the lunch break.
- ❖ At many shows the Ring Steward is also the equipment checker. See the session on Equipment Checks for information on this task.
